Mark your calendars! Registration for all students will be held on the following dates: **Thursday, August 5th from noon-7:00 p.m. and Monday, August 9th from noon-7:00 p.m.**

During registration, parents will be asked to update demographic and emergency contact information, complete athletic participation requirements (WIAA sports physical cards and alternate year cards, activity codes) and pick up student handbooks.

Students new to the district are required to furnish a copy of the student's immunizations and may be asked to furnish proof of residence. Students must be 4 years old by September 1 to be eligible for 4-year old Kindergarten and 5 by September 1 to be eligible for 5-year old Kindergarten.

Student fees and food service payments will also be collected during registration. Student schedules will NOT be available until all fees have been paid.

All students in grades 6-11 are required to have their school photographs taken during registration. Photographers will be available from 3:00-6:00 p.m. both days. Lifetouch package options are explained in this newsletter. Order forms will be available at registration. All packages ordered from Lifetouch must be prepaid. Elementary pictures will be taken September 14 and order forms will be sent home with students the first week of school.

From the Desk of the Principal

What a beautiful summer we're having. It's hard to believe I'm writing a "welcome back" letter but we are so excited about the 2010-2011 school year. The maintenance staff is furiously working to get the school ready. It already looks amazing. We have been working hard on a few things that we think are very important for the upcoming year. We have a new attendance and bullying policy in place.

Our attendance policy is fairly similar to the old policy but it is more detailed. It is in accordance with state and village statutes. We will be very proactive in regulating student's attendance. If any attendance issues arise, there will be generous amounts of time and notice given before any truancy tickets are issued. The policy is available at the school and can be found on our website. More importantly than the policy, is the emphasis it puts on students attending school regularly.

The new bullying policy is a good reminder to both staff and students to beware of bullies. We are fortunate here in Monticello to have great kids, but unfortunately bullying still happens everywhere. The bullying policy also has a very important cyber bullying component. It will help us provide guidelines in dealing with bullying behaviors on internet networking sites, cell phones and emails.

Also new this school year, the middle school and high school will be doing MAPS testing (Measure of Academic Progress). MAPS is an assessment tool that we have implemented to identify student's strengths and weaknesses in reading, math, science and social studies. We're very fortunate to have this tool at our disposal. It is very effective because we will receive results instantly and we will be able to use the data immediately this school year. Student's reports will be sent home after testing is completed.

Lastly, don't forget if your child is participating in any fall activity, they will need a physical or alternate year card. Appointments for physicals are available at Monroe Clinic and they are running special dates and prices later this summer.

If you have any questions feel free to contact me at school or stop by. Enjoy the remainder of your summer. I look forward to seeing you at registration and open house.

Student Registration

We continue to implement changes in our registration procedures to make the process more organized and efficient. To simplify the registration process, you will be able to enter much of the necessary information yourself using our Family Access feature on our website (www.monticello.k12.wi.us)

Log into Family Access at home under "quick links" to update your information (*address, phone numbers, e-mail addresses, emergency contact information, day care provider details, health alerts, and other important information or*

Update your records at registration using the computers in the Computer Lab. We will help you log in and work through the process.

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING CAREFULLY

Enter through the lower parking lot doors by the Computer Lab where you will be able to pick up information and a checklist prepared specifically for your family. It will include a list of past due fees and fines if applicable. A staff member will need to sign indicating you have updated your records, either from home or using a school computer. Students that are new to the district will be asked to register at the District Office.

You will complete the checklist by visiting the following stations and having your sheet initialed as complete:

- **Athletics/Co-Curriculars:** If your Middle or High School child is involved in athletics or any school co-curricular activity, you must have a complete, signed Activity Participation Form on file. We will also be checking that you have the required WIAA Physical Card or Alternate Year Card on file. This is also your opportunity to ask questions about the Activity Code.
- **Food Service:** Confirm any outstanding balances that must be paid and determine your initial deposit into your child's lunch account. Ask questions about the program, obtain free and reduced lunch applications and indicate any special dietary needs or food allergies.
- **Health Services:** Students entering 5 year Old Kindergarten must have a physical or appointment scheduled before starting school and be up-to-date on all vaccinations. If your child needs to take prescription medication at school, a form must be completed by your child's physician. If you want us to keep over-the-counter medications at school to administer to your child as needed, you must complete a medication form.
- **Payment Station:** After completing your visit to each of the stations, we will calculate your total due for fees and lunch deposits. Pay by cash, check or credit card. If there is any doubt about adding or dropping classes that have fees, you may be directed to visit the Scheduling/Counseling Station before making your payment.
- **Scheduling/Counseling Station:** This is your last stop. PLEASE NOTE YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO OBTAIN MIDDLE SCHOOL OR HIGH SCHOOL SCHEDULES WITHOUT VERIFICATION THAT YOUR FEES AND FINES HAVE BEEN PAID.
- **Middle/High School Pictures:** All students grades 6-11 should plan to have their pictures taken during registration. No appointments are needed-come anytime between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m. You are not required to purchase school pictures, but we still need your picture taken for student ID's, yearbooks, and various school projects. Pictures will be taken on the Mezzanine in the High School Gym.

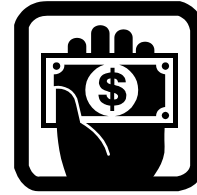

Student Medications

Students needing non-prescription medication (Tylenol, Ibuprofen, etc.) on a regular or as-needed basis, must provide their own supply to the District Office along with a medication form signed by a parent. This form is available at registration or by request during the year. Medication must be clearly labeled with the student's name and must be in its original container. All medication is locked in the District Office.

Prescription medications that need to be taken at school require the physician's signature on a school medication form. If your child has any health concerns that require attention at school, please discuss them with the School Nurse or the District Secretary.

Transportation Issues

Each year we review the lists of students requiring transportation to and from school. Changes in pickup times and assignments may be made in order to make student transportation more efficient.

If your child needs transportation to and/or from a daycare provider

outside of the village, you must complete a Day Care Service request form. A copy of this form is included in this packet for your convenience. District Policy 8600 states that **"buses shall not operate on private streets or roads unless the walk is considered a safety**

hazard. Buses shall not travel on dead end roads unless adequate turn-around areas are provided at the end of such roadway."

Pickup times will be posted at Open House August 30th.

Bus Safety

With school about to start, it is again time to remind parents to talk to their children about bus safety. Although your children may not ride a bus on a regular basis, they still need to be made aware of the bus safety rules.

All riders must be seated at all times. Keep aisles clear. Keep head and arms inside bus at all times. Do not shout or distract the driver unnecessarily.

Remember that bus riding is a privilege-not a right. For the safety of all riders, students who fail to follow bus rules or who disobey the driver will be suspended from bus transportation.

Monticello Foundation Scholarships Available

College students continuing their post-secondary education are urged to apply for one of the scholarships being awarded in October by The Monticello Foundation, Inc. Students must have earned 24 college credits

and be a graduate of Monticello High School to apply. Applicants are judged based on need, local community service, grades and leadership roles. Applications are available in the high school office or on

the school's website at www.monticello.k12.wi.us under Guidance. The deadline for submitting applications is September 10.

Senior Citizens Admitted to Athletic Events

District residents age 55 and older receive free admission to all conference athletic events. The only exceptions

are WIAA sponsored tournaments and non-conference events.

Student/Parent Handbook & Activity Code

If your child is in Middle School or High School, it is important that you take some time and read over the Student/Parent Handbook and Activity Code before the school year begins. You will find the policies and procedures that your child or children are expected to know and follow.

You will also find an explanation of the services we offer and our educational expectations for our students. You will also find specific directions for implementing any procedures necessary for your child's involvement in our school or school sponsored programs. We hope you find these handbooks helpful and meaningful throughout the year.

Age of Majority

The School District of Monticello recognizes that when a student reaches the age of majority (990.01, Wis. Stats.) they are generally afforded all the rights and privileges of adulthood. Students who are eighteen years old are subject though to the same rules and expectations as other students except as noted in the Student /Parent Handbook. Upon reaching their eighteenth birthday students are required to fill out an "Attendance Contract". Failure to fill out the contract does not exempt a student from following the same rules, but rather denies them some of the privileges that they would be afforded.

Homeroom/Activity Period

This is an important part of the day and all students are expected to be present. Those students who have earned RP Passes are only required to be in Homeroom if they are participating in an activity or a meeting. Homeroom is used for class/activity meetings, school announcements, taking of attendance, etc. Students are expected to be in school by 8:05 a.m. to participate in any school related function or co-curricular activity being held on that day.

Student Attendance

Each student at Monticello Middle/High School is expected to be present for all classes, including homeroom and study halls, unless attendance is impossible due to illness or other excusable reason, such as a family emergency. All faculty and staff members are required to take attendance at the beginning of every class period. Students must be present by 8:05 a.m. in order to participate in or attend any school related function or co-curricular activity being held on that day unless there are unusual circumstances as determined by the principal. **It is imperative that parents/guardians follow this procedure when they know that their child will be absent.**

Parents are required to call school prior to 8:00 a.m. on the day of the student's absence and give the reason for the absence. **Failure to appropriately notify the office will result in the absence being recorded as unexcused.** Please call 938-PONY. This line is accessible 24 hours a day. We will attempt to contact all parents regarding unexcused absences. (See the Student/Parent Handbook for additional information.) **TRUANCY:** It is the School District of Monticello's intent to abide by and enforce Section 118.15 of the Wisconsin Statutes regarding compulsory school attendance. (see the Student/Parent Handbook for further information.)

Throughout the school day Middle School/High School students have 4 minutes to move between classes. Students need to plan their trips to their lockers to accommodate the time available. Students are expected to be in their classes on time. All students who are tardy three or more times to any class will be required to make up time. Students participating in the Renaissance Program will lose this privilege for the remainder of the quarter. (See the Student/Parent Handbook for additional information).

Parents may review their child's attendance record by logging into the Family Access feature on the district website.

Student Attendance (Board Policy 5200)

(All families should consult the complete policy in the student handbook.)

The Board of Education encourages a strong partnership between the home, school and community. It recognizes a positive relationship between good school attendance and success in school and employment. If student learning and growth are to take place, parent(s)/guardians, students and school personnel must recognize their responsibilities to assure regular attendance.

The Board in recognition of the statutory requirements for school attendance and the overwhelming public need for an educated society, believes school attendance should take precedence over non-school activities. State law requires every child between six and eighteen years of age to be in school unless he/she:

- is excused temporarily for physical or mental reasons, or other reasons defined by the Board;
- has graduated;
- has been authorized to attend an alternative educational program; or
- has been excused by his/her parent(s)/guardian prior to an absence in accordance with state law.

It is the responsibility of any person having under his/her control such a child to ensure regular attendance during the full period and hours that school is in session until the end of the quarter or semester of the school year in which the child becomes eighteen years of age.

It is the responsibility of the parent(s)/guardian to notify the school of student absences in accordance with established district procedures. When students are absent from school, parent(s)/guardians assume full responsibility for their activities. It is the responsibility of the principal or designee to determine whether the absence is excused or unacceptable.

Parents have the right to request the school board to provide program or curriculum modifications as outlined in section 118.15 (1)(d) of the state statutes. The school board will respond to such requests in writing in accordance with 118.15 (1)(dm) of the state statutes.

Closed Campus Policy

Students are expected to be engaged in school-related or sponsored activities during the time designated by the Board as the school day. Students are not permitted to leave school or engage in non-school related activities during the school day without the knowledge and permission of the school administrator or his/her designee. Requests to leave the school must be made to the office by the student's parent or guardian no later than the day before.

Student Locker Policy

Lockers will be assigned to students for their convenience. The privilege of using a locker is extended on the basis that it is kept clean and in good condition. All lockers should be kept locked. Locks for these lockers are to be purchased from the school and kept by the student throughout the student's middle school/high school years. No unauthorized locks will be permitted. School-approved locks are available in the office for \$5.00 each. If locks other than those purchased from the school are used on school lockers, they will be removed. The student will be financially responsible for any damage to the locker.

School lockers are the property of the School District of Monticello. At no time does the school district relinquish the exclusive control of the lockers provided for the students. Periodic general inspections

of lockers may be conducted by school authorities (e.g. district administrator, principal, or designee) for any reason, at any time, without notice, without student consent, and without a search warrant.

We strongly urge all students to lock their lockers. The District accepts NO responsibility for items missing from unlocked lockers.

Unauthorized or illegal items found in a locker are presumed to be the property and/or responsibility of the person assigned to the locker. Any item deemed to be in violation of school rules, unsafe, dangerous, or illegal found in the locker may be removed. At the discretion of the administrator or designee, unauthorized items removed from the locker will be held by the school and may be returned to the parent(s)/guardian of the student after the consequences of any disciplinary proceedings. Illegal items will be turned over to law enforcement officials. The adult student and/or the parent(s)/guardian of a minor student shall be notified of the illegal items removed from the locker and turned over to law enforcement officials. The district administrator, or designee, can authorize drug detection teams to use canines trained for drug detection for random searches of school buildings and grounds.

Use of Backpacks, Book Bags and Athletic Bags

Book bags, backpacks, *oversized purses*, athletic bags or similar items may be used only for the purpose of transporting books, other school related materials, and personal effects to and from school. Immediately upon the student's arrival at school, any book bag, backpack, athletic bag or similar item must be deposited in the locker assigned to the pupil. Bags deposited in the lockers must be left open (i.e. unlocked, unsnapped or unzipped). This regulation shall be strictly enforced by all school staff to reduce the risk of contraband, such as controlled substances, tobacco, alcohol and weapons being brought to school or concealed in a locker, which is the property of the Monticello School District.

No student will be allowed to carry a book bag, backpack, athletic bag or similar item on school property during the school day except in relation to physical education. Any clothes needed for the student's physical education class may be secured from their locker at a time designated by the teacher with teacher approval.

Notice of Student Records Policy

Student records are maintained in the interest of the student to assist the school in providing appropriate educational experiences. Such records shall be accumulated, maintained, released, transferred and destroyed by the building principal or his/her qualified designee in accordance with state and federal laws. Only those individuals or agencies specifically authorized by state and federal law shall be granted access to a student's records. Exceptions shall only be made when the student's parent/guardian, or an adult student, grants permission.

An adult student, or the parent(s)/guardian(s) of a minor student, may inspect student records kept by the school in accordance with Board of Education Policy 8330 and established procedures and may challenge the content if he/she believes the records are inaccurate or misleading. Copies of the Board's student records policy and procedures are available upon request during regular office hours (8:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.) at: Monticello Public School District Office, 334 S. Main Street, Monticello, Wisconsin 53570.

Complaints regarding the content of student records may be made to the building principal, who shall make arrangements for a hearing to review the challenged record(s). If the complainant is not satisfied with the hearing officer's decision regarding the challenged record(s), he/she may file a complaint with the Family Policy and Regulations Office of the United States Department of Education.

Further, the Monticello Board of Education has designated the following student record information as directory data:

Student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of

attendance, photographs, degrees and awards received and the name of the school most recently attended by the student.

This information may be disclosed to any person UNLESS the adult student, or the parent or guardian of a minor student, informs the school within 14 days of this notice that all or any part of the directory data may not be released without the prior consent of the adult student, parent or guardian. High school students and their parents/guardian may also request that the student's name, address and telephone listing not be released to military recruiters or institutions of higher education without prior written consent. Refusal of such release shall be made to Dr. Karen Ballin, District Administrator no later than 14 days after receipt of this notice. In compliance with the Final Regulations-Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, dated June 17, 1986 and Wisconsin State Statutes, the School District of Monticello releases records to other schools or districts which request them without the parent's or adult student's consent.

In accordance with Wisconsin Act 309, the District will make student records available to any law enforcement officers who are individually designated by the school board and assigned to the school district. Student records will also be made available to those school district employees required by the DPI to hold a license and to other school district officials who have been determined by the school board to have legitimate educational interests in the records.

Pupil Rights Regarding Privacy

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA), 20 U.S.C. s123h, requires the Monticello School District to notify you and obtain consent or allow you to opt your child out of participating in certain school activities. These activities include a student survey, analysis, or evaluation that concerns one or more of the following eight areas ("protected information surveys"):

1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent;
2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
3. Sexual behavior or attitudes;
4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behaviors;
5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
7. Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or
8. Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.

This requirement also applies to the collection, disclosure or use of student information for marketing purposes ("marketing surveys"), and invasive, non-emergency physical exams or screenings that are:

- a. Required as a condition of attendance
- b. Administered by the school and scheduled in advance and
- c. Not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of the student or other students.

The Monticello School District will make every effort to advise parents/guardians in advance of any activities that fall within the above listed guidelines.

Accommodating Student Religious Beliefs

The School District of Monticello recognizes the need to foster understanding and mutual respect among students, parents, and school personnel on such matters as race, culture, economic background and religious beliefs. In promoting the spirit of tolerance, the district allows students to be excused from participating in practices which are contrary to their religious beliefs upon parent request. Parental requests should be submitted to the principal in writing. When a request is approved, the student will be given alternative activities which are consistent with the objectives of the regular course activities. Students choosing not to participate in practices contrary to their religious beliefs will not be penalized in any manner.

Cell Phones and Other Two-Way Communication Devices

Board policy 5612 regulates student use of cell phones and other two-way communication devices. Generally, students may use cell phones before school, after school and during the lunch period provided they do not create a distraction. At all other times cell phones must be turned completely off and kept out of sight. Under no circumstances will cell phones with photographic capabilities be allowed in locker rooms, rest rooms or other areas where one could reasonably expect privacy. Consequences for violation of the cell phone policy include, but are not limited to, confiscation of the phone, in-school suspension or referral to law enforcement if warranted. The complete policy is available upon request through the District Office and will be reviewed with students upon their return for the school year.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

- The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the school district receives a request for access.
- The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes is inaccurate or misleading.
- The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
- The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Dept. of Education, 400 Maryland Ave. SW, Washington, DC 20202.

Notice of Child Find Activity

The school district has a duty to locate, identify, and evaluate all resident children with special educational needs, regardless of the severity of their disability. Therefore, the school district has a screening program to locate and screen all children suspected of having disabilities who are residents of the district and who have not graduated from high school. The school district locates and screens children in the following groups: children below school-entry age; children entering school for the first time; children currently enrolled in public and private schools; all transfer students; school-age children who are eligible to attend school but who are not attending school and who are residents of the district. Upon request, the school district will screen any child to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. Such a request may be made by contacting Ruth Voight, Special Education Director for the School District of Monticello at (608) 938-4194 or writing her at 334 S. Main Street, Monticello, WI 53570.

Non-Discrimination Policy

The Monticello School District will not discriminate in curricular, co curricular, pupil service, recreational or other program or activity on the basis of sex, race, religion, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital or parental status, sexual orientation, physical disability, emotional disability or learning disability. This policy will prevail in all matters concerning staff, students, the public, educational programs, services and individuals with whom the Board does business. The complete Board Policy 5102 regarding nondiscrimination, as well as complaint procedures, is available upon request from the District Office. Any complaints must be filed in writing with District Administrator Karen Ballin, Monticello School District, 334 South Main Street, Monticello, Wisconsin 53570. Any questions regarding the policy should be directed to Dr. Ballin at 938-4194.

Youth Options Program

The Youth Options Program allows all public high school juniors and seniors who meet certain requirements to take postsecondary courses at a Wisconsin technical college or institution of higher

learning. This program provides students with greater learning opportunities if they are planning to pursue a technical career, begin college early, or enter the workforce immediately after high school graduation. The student does not have to pay for the postsecondary course if the school board determines the course may receive high school credit and the course is not comparable to a course offered in the school district. The high school will grant a diploma to a student who has successfully completed high school graduation standards, regardless of whether the requirements were met at the high school or a postsecondary institution. Additional information can be obtained in the guidance office.

Information about Title I Programs

The Monticello School District participates in the federal Title I program in order to provide additional academic support for students in the primary grades. As a condition for receiving these funds, we are obligated to honor requests from parents/guardians for information regarding the child's classroom teacher/s regarding a) whether the teacher has met state licensing criteria for the grade level/s and subject are/s taught; b) whether the teacher is teaching under an emergency or provisional status through which state licensing criteria have been waived; c) the undergraduate degree of the teacher, and any graduate certification or degree including the field of discipline of the certification or degree.

In addition to making teacher qualifications available upon request, we are obligated to provide the professional qualifications of para-professionals who may be providing instructional services to your child.

Automated Phone System

The School District of Monticello has a fully automated phone system for your convenience. Messages left for students should be kept to a minimum. Students will not be called out of class except for emergencies.

Calls to teachers should be placed either **before or after school** or **during the teacher's prep time** to prevent disrupting the classroom. You may continue to report student absences by calling the "Pony Line" at 938-PONY (7669). The Pony Line is automated 24 hours a day for your calling convenience.

Medication and Emergency Care

Whenever possible, student medication should be taken at home. If it is necessary for a child to take medication during the school day, the following guidelines are to be followed: Medication must be in a clean pharmaceutical container which has the same medication name, unit size, dosage and student's name attached. Medication shall be kept in the school office for safekeeping.

Students needing non-prescription medication, including Tylenol on a regular or as needed basis, must provide their own supply to the Elementary or Middle School/High School Office, along with a signed medication form (available at registration or throughout the year). Medication must be clearly labeled with the student's name and in its original container.

A prescription drug may be administered by school officials providing that:

- a) Completion of the school form by a physician indicates the guidelines for administering the medication(s). The physician providing the directions and prescribing the medication must also state in writing, either on the prescription, or in a letter, the specific conditions under which he/she should be contacted regarding the condition or reaction of the student receiving the medication. The physician must also express a willingness to accept communication from the school official dispensing the medications.
- b) Written permission to administer the drug(s) from the student's parent/guardian must accompany the medication.

Any unused medication at the end of the period for which prescribed or at the end of the school year shall be picked up by the parent/guardian. Medication not claimed will be destroyed.

Accident Insurance

The School District of Monticello *does not carry accident insurance for any student or athlete*. Parents or guardians are responsible for carrying accident insurance on their child or dependent. If a student wishes to participate in athletics, he or she *must provide proof of insurance coverage*.

Parents are encouraged to review their present health and accident insurance program to determine if coverage is adequate. Information on an accident insurance plan designed to provide benefits for medical expenses incurred due to accidents will be available at registration.

Monticello Public Schools Dress Code

Accountability for personal appearance of students in the Monticello School District rests with the students and their parents/guardians. Dress or grooming will not be allowed to disrupt the learning process within the classroom or school, or to affect the health or safety of students and staff. Inappropriate dress will not be allowed at any school function or event.

Summer attire is allowed during warm weather; however, clothing must cover and fit the student properly. Bare midriff or backless tops and dresses are not considered appropriate. Straps and ties are acceptable if attached at both shoulders. Tops and dresses must cover the student from armpit to armpit and hang down to the waistband. The length of shorts, skirts, and dresses must be appropriate and not disrupt the learning process within the classroom or school.

Pants should not hang down to the point that a student's underwear is visible. Attachments to apparel that may cause damage to district furniture such as chains, spikes, etc. are not permitted.

1. Safe footwear must be worn. No slippers are permitted.
2. Students are required to wear safety or special purpose equipment whenever it is required in class.
3. Students are not permitted to wear clothing, jewelry or other items promoting alcohol, tobacco or illegal substances.
4. Students are not permitted to wear clothing that has offensive print. Offensive print includes, but is not limited to, words, statements or graphics referencing discriminatory statements, immorality, profanity, sexual connotations, suggestive statements or obscenities.
5. Hats and hoods are to be removed when entering the building.
6. Students receiving recognition for representing Monticello Schools are expected to wear appropriate dress clothing for the event (e.g. performances, awards ceremonies, etc.)

Students not complying with the dress code will be expected to change their clothes. Repeated violations will result in additional consequences. Students needing to leave school to change their clothes will be considered unexcused.

If, in the opinion of any staff member, a student's dress or appearance detracts from the learning process; is an undesirable influence on students; or violates the rules listed above, the staff member will direct the offending student to the principal/office staff. The student offender will be asked to change clothing or to cover up.

Soon we will start another school year. Many decisions will have to be made by our seniors. If they intend to continue their education beyond high school, a decision will have to be made, as to where this education will take place. Once that decision is either made or narrowed down to a couple of schools, applications need to be filled out and sent. Monticello's goal is to have all applications sent by the first part of October. Most schools begin accepting applications September 15th. If you are applying to a school that is competitive in admissions (i.e. UW-

Madison), a program that fills up fast (i.e. MATC-Madison art or health programs), or if your G.P.A. or ACT scores are lower, you need to get your application in as early as possible. Seniors, if you have not taken the ACT or wish to retake the test, the first test date is September 11. Other test dates are October 23, December 11, February 12, April 9, and June 11. The registration fee for the ACT is \$33.00. For this fee your test scores will be sent to up to four colleges that you request. Some schools are now requiring that you also take a writing test

which is available for an additional \$15.00. Make sure you are aware of registration deadlines because ACT charges an additional \$21.00 as a late fee. Students are encouraged to register online and obtain additional information at www.actstudent.org.

Juniors who wish to take the ACT are advised to wait until one of the spring test dates.

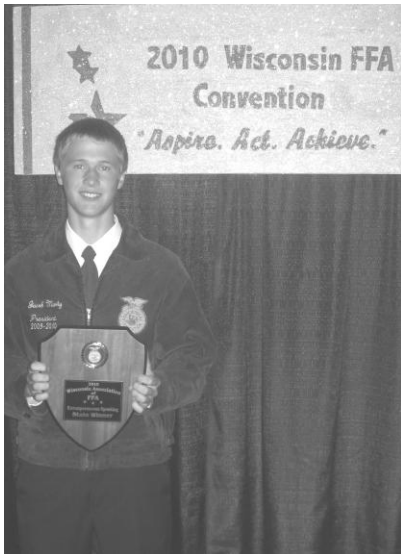

A map of the building is being updated to assist in crisis planning. Truancy, MAPS, and the GUPPY Press Conference were also discussed. Amanda Jacobson was recently awarded a Horace Mann Fellowship to study at the Lincoln Museum in Springfield, Illinois. 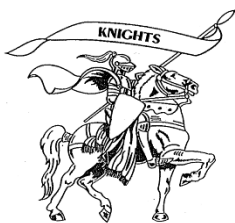
