ANNUAL MESSAGE TO THE COMMUNITY

Dear Community Members:

I am excited and proud of the state of our district largely in part because you, our community, continue to be so supportive. We appreciate your willingness to allow us to be progressive in our mission to provide many opportunities and implement a vision of success for Monticello youth.

We are finishing the 2023-2024 school year by decreasing our fund balance by \$298,209. We are currently presenting a negative Fund 10 budget for 2024-2025. Our total budget representing all funds is \$7,656,807. This represents a 2.8% decrease in expenditures over last year. Our proposed property tax levy is anticipated at \$2,900,116. With the information available to us, we estimate that our mill rate will be 7. 7% which is a 0.0% increase over last year.

Our budget and policies will allow us to prioritize the following essential areas vital to student success:

- This past summer, we made significant investments in our school's infrastructure to improve both comfort and energy efficiency. We completed a comprehensive HVAC controls upgrade, which we anticipate will not only create a more comfortable climate for our students and staff but also lead to more economical control and energy savings. Additionally, in May, we installed a solar panel system. This project is expected to save us over \$10,000 annually in energy costs. We're proud to announce that you can monitor the solar system's energy production in real-time by visiting our website and clicking on the "Solar Power" link. Importantly, both the HVAC controls upgrade and the solar project were funded independently of the 2022 referendum funds. This approach reflects our board's commitment to fiscal responsibility, ensuring a balanced use of both district monies and referendum funds for various projects. These upgrades demonstrate our dedication to creating a sustainable, comfortable learning environment while also being prudent stewards of our financial resources.
- For the 2024-2025 budget, we're excited to highlight Fund 80, our community service fund. This special fund allows us to extend our resources beyond traditional K-12 education, directly benefiting our wider community. In this budget cycle, we've allocated Fund 80 resources to several key initiatives:
 - 1. Full day 4K opportunities, providing valuable early childhood education opportunities
 - 2. Our summer community recreation programming for Monticello's children
 - 3. Middle school sports programs, fostering youth development and teamwork
 - 4. Community activities like "Play with the Pony," encouraging intergenerational engagement
 - 5. Our fitness facility, which is available to community members for five hours daily throughout the year

These efforts reflect our commitment to making school resources accessible to all community members. Fund 80 represents a collaborative approach where our community can directly support and benefit from these shared initiatives. We're proud of how these programs enrich our community and strengthen the bond between our school and the residents we serve.

It should be noted that Fund 80 operates outside of our school's revenue limit and is in addition to the local taxes levied to provide revenue for our school district. This structure allows us to offer these valuable community services without impacting our core educational budget. By participating in and supporting Fund 80 programs, our community plays a crucial role in enhancing educational and recreational opportunities for all, while maintaining fiscal responsibility in our main school funding.

- We continue to invest in our mental health team by employing a full time school counselor, a full time school advisor, a part-time school psychologist, and director of pupil services. Our newly formed and diverse team masterfully handles the new challenges and career and college planning with a renewed mission for our staff and students.
- We continue to invest in our students' futures. Our school board continues to provide scholarship opportunities to reward students taking dual enrollment classes and who earn A's by reimbursing half of their tuition. This has saved thousands of dollars for Monticello families. We continue to collaborate with the Albany, Brodhead, Blackhawk, and Juda School Districts to expand our ability to share classes via telepresence and connect with other school districts and higher education institutions. Our dual credit options have steadily grown, thanks to innovative technology, creative scheduling, and dedicated teachers who invest extra time in their own education. We now offer 10 dual enrollment or Advanced Placement (AP) courses, including College English 101, 201, and 250, Astronomy, Statistics, Pre-Calculus, Calculus, Physics, Spanish IV (14 college credits), AP US History, and AP Chemistry. Additionally, we provide courses like Medical Terminology, Oral and Written Communication, Shop Math, Psychology, Accounting, Sociology, College Mathematics, Animal Science, and three Welding classes in partnership with local technical schools.

Through the JAM'B (Juda, Albany, Monticello, Brodhead, Black Hawk) academic cooperative, we also offer Tech Math, Computer Programming, and Video Gaming via Telepresence. Monticello's dual enrollment programs are a model of success for rural school districts, providing students with a broader educational experience that enhances college readiness and future success. Beyond academic benefits, the program positively impacts the local economy and community, making it a valuable investment in growth and development.

- Monticello students are often rewarded with tremendous community support. The 23 students in the 2024
 graduating class earned over \$172,350 in scholarships last spring. Most of which were awarded to students that took
 advantage of and participated in a variety of dual enrollment options. To say that they have a headstart on peers
 both financially and academically is an understatement.
- We continue to be leaders in consciously driving technology forward. Since 2018, we have provided fee free 1:1 devices (Chromebooks) for our 3-12 students and now we are able to be completely 1:1 for all students. In addition, we have also completed 1:1 for all students. In addition, we have also completed 100% of our next generation interactive white board project.
- Our Annual Day of Service started in the spring of 2016 and was back again for 2024. It's been a great way to give back
 to our community and have our students interact and be active members of Monticello, which includes 4K-12 students
 in various projects. This years' service day will be April 26, 2025. Please let us know if you have any projects with which
 you need assistance.

We are very proud of the education and future that a Monticello diploma offers our students. We are committed to continuous academic and socio-emotional growth and to providing opportunities only a small rural school can offer. Thank you for your continued support of our school and keep in mind our mission statement, Monticello's Values Grow World Ready Citizens!

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Parents and Guardians,

We are now approaching the end of the 1st quarter for the 2024-25 school year. It is important to continue to stress the importance of regular school attendance. Consistent attendance allows students to be full participants in lessons, class discussions, and helps students to benefit from the support and guidance of their teachers.

When students miss school, they have a greater tendency to fall behind on important coursework, and miss out on valuable learning opportunities. Relationships with peers may also become strained if students miss a large amount of school. We understand that there may be times when your child may need to be absent due to illness or other unavoidable circumstances, but it is essential to minimize absences whenever possible.

The district's attendance policy is outlined in the Elementary, Middle and High School Handbooks. Students that miss 10 days of school may be considered habitually truant. That can lead to referral to the Green County Truancy Diversion program, or potentially receiving a truancy ticket from Green County. The schools of Green County have been working with the Green County Justice Department to enforce school attendance. A truancy ticket has a monetary penalty to it, as well as a family court hearing. Parents may be fined if their students become habitually truant.

Absences have an impact on our school report card as well. Students that miss 10% of school days (17 absences) are considered to be chronically absent. If the school district's percentage of chronically absent students is below the state average it can lead to a lower score on the report card.

Again, the purpose of this letter/email is to make sure that you are aware of the emphasis that we place on school attendance, and the importance that being at school plays in the success of your children. Please review the district attendance policy.




IMPLEMENTATION OF WEIGHTED GPAs

In our commitment to growing world-ready citizens and providing high-level opportunities, Monticello Schools is initiating a new focus on academic performance. Despite our small, rural setting, we are proud to offer numerous rigorous courses that challenge and prepare our students for their futures. Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, we will implement a weighted GPA scale, reflecting our dedication to preparing students for an increasingly competitive global environment. Juniors and Seniors will now be able to see their weighted & unweighted cumulative GPAs on their report card. Freshmen & Sophomores will only see an unweighted GPA since the majority of our weighted classes cannot be taken until the junior or senior year.

A weighted GPA (Grade Point Average) is a way of measuring a student's academic performance that takes into account the difficulty of the courses they take. Here's a simple breakdown for parents:

- 1. **Standard GPA**: Typically, GPAs are on a 4.0 scale, where an A is worth 4 points, a B is 3 points, and so on. This is called an unweighted GPA and does not consider course difficulty.
- 2. **Weighted GPA**: In contrast, a weighted GPA adds extra points for more challenging courses, in our case this applies to AP courses or dual enrollment courses through the Wisconsin Technical College system or Universities of Wisconsin. For example:
 - o An A in a regular class might still be worth 4.0 points.
 - o An A in a dual enrollment course with Blackhawk Technical College might be worth 4.5 points.
 - o An A in an AP or CAPP class with UW Oshkosh might be worth 5.0 points.
- 3. **Purpose**: This system rewards students for taking more difficult courses. It can give a more accurate picture of a student's academic abilities and efforts.
- 4. **Calculation**: To calculate a weighted GPA, you multiply the grade points by the course credits, sum them up, and then divide by the total number of credits.

Where will this be utilized: Many colleges consider weighted GPAs to assess applicants' rigor in their coursework, making it beneficial for students to challenge themselves academically. Wisconsin high schools are also now required to rank students for the purpose of determining the top 5% & 10% of each class at the end of their junior year. These rankings are used to determine who will be offered automatic admission to the Universities of Wisconsin through the Wisconsin Guarantee. The top 10% of each class receives automatic admission to every UW excluding UW-Madison; the top 5% receives automatch admission to every UW including UW-Madison. Ranking based on weighted GPAs should provide a clear picture of which students are the most college-ready based on the types of classes they have taken in preparation for post-secondary education. Monticello schools will also use ranking based on weighted GPA to determine the valedictorian of each graduating class based on their cumulative GPA at the end of the first semester of their senior year.

A friendly reminder to everyone that it is important that students wear proper clothing while riding the bus so they stay warm this winter. - VI. Administrative Team Reports: Director of Pupil Services: Mrs. Francois said special education is off to a great start and the team is doing a great job. EC-21 Principal: Mr. Gustafson also said it's been a great start to the new school year. Teachers are well prepared and appreciative of in-service times and schedules. Students are eager and excited to learn. Focusing on being safer with student pick-up. New math curriculum for the K-8 students. ACT 20 is a new early literacy mandate from the state that's being incorporated into the elementary testing schedule. District Administrator: Mr. Brokopp stated the school applied and was awarded a \$10,000 school safety grant for digital mapping. Two summer school days, summer fitness, summer school activities have helped to add 7 FTE to our student count.
